Jesus told His disciples,

Open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest. Even now the reaper ... harvests the crop for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may be glad together.

(John 4:34-35)

In the state of Mato Grosso, near the border with Paraguay, the girls had watched their parents teach some Indians of the Terena tribe how to share the good news about Jesus. Now, in the state capital of Rio Grande do Sul, their parents wanted to make friends for Jesus and start a church.

What could Flora and Linda do to

help? To begin with, they made friends with neighbor kids their age. Soon their parents got the idea of having a meeting in the house, for kids only, once a week. Dad would play his accordion while everybody sang. Then they would watch a short film, and Mom would tell a Bible story with pictures.



Did You Know?...

- Brazil occupies half of South America's land surface and has over half of South America's population.
- The City of Rio de Janeiro has a soccer stadium as high as a six-story building. It took 500,000 sacks of cement to build it.
- Unlike the rest of Latin America, which speaks Spanish, Brazil is Portuguese speaking because it was a colony of Portugal.
- Although Brazil's constitution allows freedom of religion, Catholicism is granted many special privileges.
- The number of people who believe the gospel is growing rapidly in many parts of the country.
- About 40% of the people participate in some form of spiritism (worship of evil spirits).



Brazil is famous for its 100-foottall "Christ the Redeemer" statue overlooking Rio, though most Brazilians don't truly know Him.
