Samba, a Baka

name is Samba. I am a 23-yearold Baka man. My home is in the vast rainforest region of South Eastern Cameroon, Africa. I have been here since my birth and have learned the ways of the forest. I learned at a young age how to make a slingshot and how to set forest traps for a variety of animals. In my free time I would create things with my hands. Things like toy cars made out of the local bamboo. The wheels I made out of old flip-flops cut into circles. I took pride in my creations and still do.



Life is difficult at times due to sickness and disease, but we continue to live. My mother makes medicine for people with a variety of medical needs. She knows which plants contain the right substances to help people. Sometimes they work, sometimes they don't.


