He has many, many ways of getting that to happen. One of those ways is to use our talents and interests as a tool to connect with people. The story of this issue is about how God is doing that in the Dominican Republic.



## Jesus and Baseball



B aseball is called America's national pastime, but it's also the favorite pastime of kids in the Dominican Republic. Boys in the Dominican grow up doing two things: going to school and playing baseball. There is no little league baseball like in America, but kids form neighborhood leagues and you can see them playing the sport on just about every

street corner. Many of those boys dream of playing in the Major Leagues when they grow up.

Bill Stothers is a missionary who also had dreams of playing professional baseball. He played all through high school and one year of college but never signed to play for a professional team. God had other plans for Bill and his wife Priscilla. In 1983 they went to live in the Dominican Republic as missionaries. They shared God's Word, discipled new believers and helped the churches grow.

It wasn't long before Bill was asked to start leading chapels for baseball players of one of the professional teams

where he lived in Santiago. Later he was asked to start a chapel with another professional team about an hour away from his home in another city. Shortly that. major after league teams started opening academies in the Dominican

Republic and Bill was asked to offer chapel services in three of those academies as well.

The baseball academies are where young players learn the sport and improve their skills. Some of the players will be recruited to play for the Major League teams in America.

Bill was eager to work with the athletes. He began leading Bible studies and helping the young men. Because of their busy schedules, the athletes aren't able to go to church. The baseball chapels bring church to the players. They meet in the dugouts or in stadiums for Bible studies and to pray together.

Today there are thirty Major League academies and six winter league teams in the Dominican Republic. Bill recruits chaplains to work with all these academies so that the hundreds of baseball players have a chance to hear the Gospel and enjoy being part of a community of believers.




Bill's first dream of being a professional baseball player didn't come true. But he trusted God to show him what to do with his life.

When asked what it's like to have served as a missionary for thirty years, Bill says, "I'm living the greatest adventure of my life, and I would do it all over again!"

Remember, God has something special for each of us to do as we live for Him. It might turn out to be something other than what you thought. One day the apostle Paul and his missionary partner, Barnabas, were in a city preaching. Some people in the city said that Paul and Barnabas should not preach to Gentiles. That is, anyone who was not a Jew. They thought that God could be known only by Jews. Paul answered them this way: "God told us that he wants us to preach to all kinds of people." Acts 13:47 is what God told them.

One day an older lady took interest in Emmanuel. She showed him love and told him about Jesus. As a teenager, Emmanuel came to know Jesus Christ as his savior.

Like most boys in the Dominican. Emmanuel loved plaving baseball. He was a talented athlete and a baseball scout signed him to play third base for one of the Major League baseball academy teams. HIs childhood dream was fulfilled when Emmanuel was invited to spring training in Florida to try out for that major league team. He and his wife moved to Florida so he could play baseball.

But then Emmanuel was cut from the team. Unlike most former players from the Dominican, Emmanuel decided to return to his home country. He knew how hard life could be for young boys there, so he started a church that especially helped young men who played baseball but never made it to the major leagues.

One day missionary Bill Stothers asked Emmanuel to be a chaplain at some of the baseball academies. Now Emmanuel works full time sharing the Good News of Jesus with players, coaches and staff in the academies and at ballparks on Sundays. He enjoys advising and guiding young men, and telling them about the love of Jesus Christ. just like that older lady didthe one who shared Jesus with him when he was a boy.
