


Issue 67: The Gospel for South Asia





Did you know...

Our story came from a country in south Asia.

The people:

That nation is **very crowded**. Over half of the people live and work on **small farms** that don't make much money. The rest of the people live in cramped towns and cities. In fact, they are the 8th most crowded country in the world.

The food:

Fresh water fish (not fish from the ocean) is the usual kind of meat the people in this country eat. Does this stew look good to you?



Children:


- 500,000 to 2 million children live as **street children**.
- Half of the children under age 5 don't get **enough food**.
- The law says that children under age 14 should not be made to go to work instead of go to school. Despite this, about 5 million children are **full time workers**.

Religion:

89% of the people are Muslims, the third-largest Muslim population in the world. 10% are Hindus, and the rest (less than one percent) are Christians, Buddhists, and animists.

This means **very, very few people there know Jesus**.
