"Hmm.. So missionary work can take a long, long time." Charlie told himself


He almost ran to catch up with the guide, who said,

ones who already can read and write, the missionaries will choose some Kwakum







people to help translate the Bible into their language.

"That will be hard, though, because there are no Kwakum words for some Bible words like 'grace,' 'gift,' and 'hope.' They will have to figure out how to explain those important parts of the Gospel.

"Missionaries also need to train church leaders. Would you like to do any of these things some day, Charlie?"

Charlie scrunched his face. "Um. Maybe. I don't know yet."

Suddenly, Whosh!

They were in a far northwest area of Cameroon, as far as the road goes.

The guide explained, "55,000 Esimbi people live in this area. The soil of their area grows plants very well. They do all their farming with hand tools, no machines. The peanuts they grow are especially good."

"Yum. I like peanut butter," Charlie said.

"Well, other people in Cameroon don't like the Esimbi very much. They look down on the Esimbi. But God doesn't.

"In 2021 the Esimbi New Testament was finished. Even before that, many Esimbi people became followers of Jesus."

Charlie clapped his hands. "Great! So they don't need missionaries now, right?"

"No, not right," the guide said. "Now they need missionaries who can help the Esimbi people who can read so that they and can make books that will teach others to read. A whole lot of the Esimbi people can't read their New Testament.

"They also need someone who will help them write songs about Jesus in their own Esimbi style instead of songs about evil spirits. Songs are a very important way to learn and to worship."



"There are other groups of people who need Jesus, too, but I have to leave you now, Charlie."

With that, Charlie woke up. "Wow, I have a lot to think about."


