Cambodia's Turbulent History

Over the past 400 years, Cambodia was controlled by Thailand, Vietnam, or France. From 1975-1979 its people endured the darkest chapter of their history, the rule of Pol Pot. With his radical brand of communism, Pol Pot depopulated the cities and sent people to work in the rural rice fields.

The powerful, the educated, and those who opposed his rule were killed. Within only three years, approximately two million Cambodians perished from starvation, disease, or outright murder.

These past events have left Cambodians with little hope and an uncertain future. While some still live hand to mouth, there is a rising middle-class culture. Globalization has brought with it technology that has transformed the cities over the past decade. But rapid change also brings many problems.

Cambodia continues to be predominately rural, with the older generations holding onto the traditions and religion of the past. The new generation knows little of their tragic history and wants to financially compete in a global economy. In the place of traditional religion, they have new gods of money and humanism, leaving them spiritually empty...and hungry!

The People

The population of Cambodia is approximately 16.7 million people. The Khmer, the predominant ethnic group, account for 85% of the population. There are more than one dozen minority groups, including the immigrant Vietnamese, Cham (Muslim), Chinese, Kui, Lao, Jarai, Kreung and the Tempuan.

Cambodia is a land of mighty rivers and monsoons in the rainy season, dry river beds, brittle brush, and parched rice fields in the dry season. It is a land of Buddhist temples, a struggling infrastructure, and a broken people who have little hope for the future.

Today Cambodians are physically and spiritually impoverished due to a turbulent national history, most recently under the horrific Pol Pot regime. The political situation has calmed in the last three decades (now a constitutional monarchy), allowing organizations of all kinds to enter in to help.

In a culture where the inclination is to let someone else do it, World Team is training and equipping Cambodian believers to reach their own people for Christ.

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Training and Releasing Leaders

World Team has been working in Cambodia since 1996 to bring hope and healing through the establishment of reproducing churches throughout the country. While the church is growing, it is still shallow, requiring discipleship and leadership development. We need your help to make this vision a reality—come join the work in Cambodia!

Innovative teams characterize the Cambodia field with ministries ranging from schools and access to education for the poor, medical ministries, university student ministry, women's literacy, vocational training programs, business approaches, modular Bible schools, and grassroots evangelism/church planting in five provinces, serving three distinct people groups. In response to the felt needs of the peoples our teams serve, workers have created initiatives to help provide a better quality of life for the Cambodian people—all while impacting the community for Christ.

Khmer

There are a multitude of ministry opportunities available across various cities and provinces. These opportunities focus on supporting, training, and empowering local leaders to effectively serve their communities. People are needed to reach, invest in, and equip these leaders to establish reproducing churches and communities of believers.

Vietnamese

There are nearly one million Vietnamese people in Cambodia. Most of them have not heard the gospel and are poor and marginalized. Ministries among the Vietnamese people include literacy classes, medical care, youth activities, personal visits to share the gospel, individual and small group discipleship as well as orphan care.

The Cham

A largely disenfranchised and impoverished minority within Cambodia, they make their living by farming, fishing, building boats, and light commerce. Workers are needed to serve among the Cham, where gospel progress has been slow. There are very few believers and no churches.
