Flora was seven and Linda was five when their family moved to a big city in Brazil named Porto Alegre. They were a family of missionaries. In the state of Mato Grosso, near the border with Paraguay, the girls had watched their parents teach some people of the Terena tribe how to share the good news about Jesus. Now, in the state capital of Rio Grande do Sul, their parents wanted to make friends for Jesus, and start a church.

What could Flora and Linda do to help? To begin with, they made friends with neighbor kids their age. Soon their

parents decided to have a meeting for kids once a week in Our Dad knows all about Jesus! the house. Dad played his accordion while everybody sang. Then watched a short film, and Mom told a Bible story with pictures.

Quite a few kids came to the meetings in their house. Sometimes one little boy from across the street would get tired and start to cry, and his sister would have to take him home.

But Ana Meri, who was Linda's age and lived next door, never came. Her mother always said, "We have our own

Waiting for the Harvest

Jesus told His disciples,

One of the first churches argued about who was most important — Paul, or Apollos. The apostle Paul had first brought them the Gospel, but Apollos had stayed longer to teach them the Gospel. So Paul wrote them a letter. He reminded them who was the main one helping them believe in Jesus. He said,

Did You Know?...


- Brazil has half of South America's land surface and has over half of South America's people.
